Towards "Section Ends"

Charles Mortimer, senior was an excellent chap. Perhaps better known as the parent of the former 125cc world road racing champion, Chas Mortimer (jnr), he was himself a former pre-war car and bike racer and performed successfully at the prestigious Brooklands motor racing circuit. I had heard of him mainly because of his association with the great engine tuner: Francis Beart. Both also sponsored riders and here I am speaking of the grand old days of British road racing, where Manx Nortons and 7R AJS's were in their ascendency. Both men had racing successes on the Isle of Man, either in the T.T. or the Manx Grand Prix. Now I noticed - probably in the pages of either, "Motorcycling" or "The Motorcycle" - the leading journals of the day, that they had jointly started a: "road racing school" sited at Brands Hatch.

By that time – the mid -sixties - I had done several season of scrambling and grass track racing but had my eyes set on becoming a road racer. It so happened that at a recent scramble hosted by the Lowestoft club at Someleyton, my gearbox had seized, causing a fair bit of expensive damage. Was this the time to swap disciplines? I decided it was. Obviously over the preceding time I had considered buying a road racing machine but even in those far-off days, racing bikes were notably expensive. It

always seems in motorcycle sport that the less you get, the more it costs! Therefore why not sign up for the, "Beart - Mortimer Racing School" to see if I could take to the sport? - which is exactly what I did. It soon became clear that Charles Mortimer was really the main personality in running the school and my application by good old-fashioned letter, was promptly yet courteously replied to by the "prospectus" of the school, or to put it more bluntly; "terms and conditions". Who could blame him teaching road racing is certainly not doing the: 'two-times-table' this is a potentially dangerous subiect!


An ACU stamped helmet, boots and leathers were obviously stipulated as a 'must'. I seem to recall a doctors note declaring full bodily and mental function was also required. The letter accompanying these and other terms, was to the point but also had a welcoming flavour. Helmet and boots I already had. The then widely-worn, "firemans" boots, (Cost: £2:50p) which I had used for racing on the rough, were acceptable, as was my helmet, an ACU approved Cromwell "pudding basin"- and goggles. Leather gloves, I had for road work - so this left the question of leathers. Should I now buy a new leather one-piece racing suit? The most famous in those days were the suits made by Lewis and as in decades before.

they were always in black. Again, they were expensive. A set of pukka road-racing leathers, cut to size, could easily be £30 to £40:00 – which at that time was nearly three weeks wages for me! What if I found I did not like road racing? The investment would be largely wasted. However, help was at hand. I had a very good and older friend, Jim Parks – himself a sprinter and founder member of the Vintage motorcycle club. He very kindly loaned me his suit. I have to point out that

Jim, now sadly departed, was of large, somewhat circular stature and when I tried his suit on I was very nearly hidden inside it. I have owned a few racing leathers since and yet Jim's were the most comfortable I have ever been enclosed by.

Now nicely togged up, and ready, I made the formal appointment for my first lesson at the Beart Mortimer school of racing....
